
- ✚ Titre : British culture





Three Britons¹ explain how they feel about their national identity.

Claire Doolan, 25, clothes shop owner, Hastings



Britain is quite welcoming and inclusive as a nation, which I appreciate. I want Britishness to mean eccentricity, inclusiveness and not being judgmental, and I think that's what I've found in Hastings. It's a curious town. Lots of people come here to escape. We have festivals that no one else has. But that's very British – pram² races, sea-boot³ races and a music festival that has very ancient roots.

Dave McNeill, 41, gallery director, Bradford



I'm Scottish, and when I travel abroad and people ask, "What nationality are you?", I always say, "I'm Scottish" before I'd ever say "I'm British", even though I've lived in England for more than 30 years. But when talking about the island that we live in, I always call it Britain. So our identity is a dual one. I also think it has changed in recent years. Our multicultural society is now what makes up Britain. It is a projection of all the cultures in it.

Lindsey Giovanni, 32, teacher, Stratford, East London



I'm proud of Britain because of its openness, diversity and creativity. That's the essence of Britain for me. My father is Italian and my mother Greek-Cypriot, but I was born in London and consider myself a Londoner. I have a lot of French, Greek and Italian friends who have visited London, and they all say how diverse and accepting London is. You are judged on what you have to offer. I work in a mixed comprehensive school⁴, with children from different backgrounds and religions, and it's nice to see the younger generation accept all those differences.
